"In 1922 Samuel Withers Green left college in Oxford to go as a missionary to Central China, where he taught at a school in Hankow. Missionaries were not always welcome, or even safe, and in 1927 he and his wife were forced to return to England, where he became minister at Leek Congregational Church. Then came an opportunity to return to Hankow, in 1934, so they packed up their belongings for what was then a long journey by train and boat. Withers Green was a good teacher, and in 1937 took a post at Yenching University. In 1939 he and his family came back to England on holiday. While they were here war broke out and their return to China was impossible. He had dedicated his life to the service of Christ in China, and for a second time he was stopped by events beyond his control.

During the war he helped to look after Czech refugees, he worked as a translator for the Government, and when the war was over, helped train teachers. But in 1949 he was at last able to return to China as Warden of Morrison Hall in Hong

Kong. He worked with students, helped run the Bible, Book and Tract Depot, and ministered in the prisons in Hong Kong. When he retired to England in 1960 he went to live in Sutton, Surrey, continuing his links with many Chinese families whose relatives lived and worked in the area, and faithfully supporting the local Churches.

He was still ready to learn and to teach, and looked forward to unity among churches in England. He died in 1976. One part of his story has been kept to the end. He served as an army Captain in the 1914-18 War and was so badly wounded in the Somme in 1916 that his left leg was amputated. His life of dedicated service was lived despite disability and pain."
