Captain F.G. Glenday

F.G. Glenday came to the School House in 1905, and after a long and honourable career at St. Bees he passed from the Sixth Form to Keble College, Oxford, in 1910 and scored an excellent second in History Finals. When the war broke out he obtained a commission in the 12th Northumberland Fusiliers, and reached the rank of Captain. But it was as an aviator that he made his name, and the following account from a brother officer describes the manner of his death: -

"He was lost in one of the biggest fights we have yet had, in which we lost two machines and two observers, six officers in all. We were attacked by some twenty hostile machines. At the beginning the leader was attacked by three machines. I at once dived to help him, and managed to drive off the enemy, but was attacked from behind by two more. Glenday kept those two off nobly, and after a fight of some minutes, in which we accounted for two machines, he shouted that he was wounded. He continued firing, however, and brought down one of the Germans. I got out of the melee as best I could and made for the lines. I landed at the first aerodrome I could get to, and sent him straight to hospital. He died on arrival there, September 16th."

K.C.M.G. awarded 1942 as Governor and Commander-in-Chief, Somaliland Protectorate. C.M.G., 1937, Provincial Commissioner, Kenya. O.B.E., 1929, for services during negotiations with the Abyssinian government, 1927-28. Brilliant Star of Zanzibar, 1951, conferred by the Sultan in recognition of valuable services rendered. Vincent Gonclaves Glenday was born 11 February 1891, and was appointed Assistant District Commissioner, East African Protectorate, 27 December 1913; Acting District Commissioner Northern Frontier, January 1914-June 1919; Officer in charge of Somali disarmament, March 1919; District Commissioner, Berbera, Somaliland, March to September 1920; between 1922 and 1926 he held similar positions, Nandi and Trans Ngora, Kacheliba, and Marsabit; Abyssinian Mission, 1927-28 (O.B.E.); Senior District Commissioner, and officer-in-charge, Northern Frontier, January 1934; Provincial Commissioner, December 1934; Governor and Commander in Chief of Somaliland Protectorate 1939-42; Colonial Office, 1942-43; British Agent in Eastern Aden Protectorate and Resident Advisor Hadramaut States 1944-45; British Resident, Zanzibar 1946-51; retired from the Colonial Administrative Service. Speaker of East African Central Legislative Assembly, September 1953 to December 1954. Note. It was the intention of the Madagascan government to award the Order of the Star to Sir Vincent Glenday during a State visit to the island. The Foreign Office, however, would not allow Glenday to accept it and it was consequently given to Lady Glenday to avoid any diplomatic embarrassment. She, however, was not
