Photocopy of a wordprocessed monograph (131pp, plus illustrations), compiled by their great-nephew in 1993, recording the lives of five of his great-uncles, the sons of the Reverend Arthur A Carre and Mrs Florence Carre, who were born between 1879 and 1894, with chapters 6 - 11, which are mainly based on secondary and official sources rather than on personal family records, covering their experiences during the First World War in which the then eldest surviving son Maurice Tennant Carre served as a private in the 1st Australian Infantry Battalion and was killed in action at Anzac, Gallipoli on 2 September 1915, Meyrick R Carre as a junior officer in the 6th Battalion, Royal West Kent Regiment who fought in the Battle of Loos and on the Somme and was awarded the Military Cross before being invalided home in October 1916, his twin brother Lieutenant Gilbert T Carre, also as a junior officer in the 6th Royal West Kents, who was wounded on the Somme in 1916, fought in the Battle of Arras in 1917 and was killed in action on the first day of the Battle of Cambrai on 20 November 1917 (with many details about him taken from the unpublished memoir of a fellow officer) and the youngest brother Lieutenant Mervyn (Edward Mervyn) Carre as an observer in No 18 Squadron RFC, an artillery observation squadron, from October 1915 until he was shot down and killed over the Somme on 16 October 1916; and also relating the story of their cousin **Roger Meyrick Heath** who joined the 6th Battalion, Somerset Light Infantry as a 2nd Lieutenant on the Somme on 14 September 1916 and was killed in action a day later.

ROGER MEYRICK HEATH was the only child of Meyrick William and Katharine Rose Heath. His mother was Headmistress of a School for girls at Mortimer House, Clifton. He entered the School with a Scholarship in 1903 and left in 1908, when he went as a Classical Scholar to Oriel College, Oxford. He obtained a First Class in Classical Moderations in 1910, and a First Class in the Final Classical School in 1912. In 1911 he gained the Newdigate Prize for English verse for his poem on "Achilles." He was elected Bishop Fraser Scholar in 1912, and in 1913 was awarded the University Diploma in Archreology, with distinction in Greek epigraphy. In the same year he published a volume of poems called Beginnings; and, having been appointed to the Craven Fellowship, he went to the British School at Athens. He took part in some excavations in Crete, and wrote an article on the"Proxeny Decrees of Megara," which was published in the Journal of the British School. Returning home in 1914 at the outbreak of the War, he put aside his life as a scholar, which had begun with high promise, and in which he had shown wit no less than insight and a delicate sense of beauty, and enlisted at once in the Public Schools Battalion, The Royal Fusiliers. He was pro- moted to the rank of Corporal, and in May, 1915, received his Commission in the Somerset Light Infantry. Early in 1916 he met with an accident while lecturing as bombing instructor, and was severely injured in his left hand. In September he went to the Front in France. He had been for several weeks attached to the 3rd Battalion and acting Assistant Adjutant, but went to France in response to a call for more Officers to join the 6th Battalion. The Colonel was opposed to his going, because his hand was still crippled, and "he was of very great use" where he was. But he was very keen to go, and his superior Officers gave way. He met his death a few hours after reaching the firing line, being killed instantaneously by a shell on September 16th, 1916, and was buried near Delville Wood. Age 27.
