Pvte 6148 Royal Fusiliers; 2/Lt Royal West Surrey; POW; survived; Composer, was born at 44 Victoria Road, Gipsy Hill, Upper Norwood, London, the seventh son and youngest of ten children of Stephen Jacob, an official of the Indian Civil Service stationed in Calcutta, and his wife, Clara Laura Forlong. He was educated at Dulwich College, where his musical gifts were encouraged by performances of early pieces for orchestra and for organ.	

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Age

He joined the army at the outbreak of the First World War and was taken prisoner in 1917. With characteristic resourcefulness he worked his way through a harmony textbook in the camp library and began composing for a camp orchestra of assorted instruments. After demobilization in 1919 and a false start as a student journalist he took a correspondence course which resulted in an ARCM diploma and acceptance as a student at the Royal College of Music in 1920. There he was a pupil of Charles Villiers Stanford and Ralph Vaughan Williams in composition, of Herbert Howells in theory, and of Adrian Boult in conducting. Both during and following the war German music was frowned upon, the new French and Russian music (Debussy, Mussorgsky, and early Stravinsky) being favoured in concert programmes. These influences, together with Parry and Elgar, are at the root of Jacob's musical language. It is more difficult to account for Jacob's early skill as an orchestrator. He had a natural curiosity concerning instrumental timbre together with a capacity to analyse, auralize, and organize. At the end of his student course in 1924 he was taken immediately onto the teaching staff of the Royal College of Music, where he remained until his retirement in 1966. In addition to his teaching commitments and examining for the Associated Board of the Royal Schools of Music, he found the time from these earliest years to pour out a ceaseless stream of compositions in every conceivable genre.

At that time choral societies and school choirs could still provide, through the sale of sheet music, a steady income and, while Jacob took advantage of this market, he also had ambitions at a more prestigious level. A viola concerto was first performed at a Prom in 1926, and a piano concerto followed in 1927. The death of a favourite brother in the First World War was the mainspring of the symphony no. 1 of 1928'969. Commissions from festivals and from the many seasonal orchestras then still prevalent in seaside towns provided further opportunities. Leon Goossens gave the first performance of his oboe concerto at a Royal Philharmonic Society concert in 1935, and the Variations on an Original Theme was first performed by the Hastings Festival Orchestra in 1937.

During the Second World War Jacob became known to a wider public through his witty arrangements of popular tunes for Tommy Handley's weekly radio comedy show ITMA. The epic symphony no. 2 of 1944'965 was described by the composer as 'a meditation on war, suffering and victory'. Four new works appeared in 1951, the year of the Festival of Britain: Music for a Festival (for brass and military bands), the horn concerto, the cantata A Goodly Heritage, and the flute concerto.

Composers now relied increasingly on fees paid by the Performing Right Society for broadcasts, and in this respect Jacob's place in Britain's musical world seemed assured. However, from 1959, as the BBC began its championship of the avant-garde, an entire generation of composers of Jacob's age and background found itself superseded. As commissions and performances dwindled at home Jacob found his music increasingly popular in Europe and especially in the USA, where his wind-band music had always found favour. He now had a stream of commissions from American universities, and continued into his final years to produce works for the many excellent school orchestras and wind bands in Great Britain that were the product of the new emphasis on instrumental music in education. Jacob suffered from a cleft palate, a handicap which often coloured his speech with a dry irony that was a delight to his pupils and friends. In 1949 he was awarded the Cobbett medal for chamber music composition. He was a DMus of London University and was appointed CBE in 1968. On 18 December 1924 he married Sidney Wilmot (b. 1888/9), daughter of the Revd Arthur Wollaston Gray,

of Ipswich. She died in 1958 and on 8 August 1959 he married her niece, Margaret Sidney Hannah, daughter of Cuthbert Arthur Gray, insurance agent of Helions Bumpstead. They had a daughter and a son. Jacob's place in musical history is as an eclectic, versatile member of the school of Vaughan Williams and Gustav Holst, rather than of the more cosmopolitan group which includes Sir William Walton and Constant Lambert. Pungent and closely argued though much of his music is, its diatonic and often modal lyricism sets it strongly apart from the prevalent style of the succeeding generation of composers, some of whom had been his pupils. He died on 8 June 1984 at his home, 1 Audley Road, Saffron Walden, and was cremated at Cambridge on 14 June. He was survived by his second wife.

Uncle

JACOB, Sir Claud William (1863-1948), army officer, was born at Mehidpore, Bombay, on 21 November 1863, the son of Lieutenant (later Major-General) William Jacob of the Indian army and his wife, Eliza, daughter of the Revd George Andrew Jacob, headmaster of Christ's Hospital, London. His uncle was Sir George Le Grand Jacob.
